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from the Deacon's Desk...



Greetings all! I hope your Summer has been as blessed as mine has. Things are SLOWLY beginning to return to normal. School will be starting soon. But we are not quite there yet. We have returned the 11:00 Mass to the church and are working to do the same with the 4:30 and 8:30 Masses. Until we do your patience is greatly appreciated. When Fr. Hourican feels we can return all the masses to the church in a safe and timely manner he will do so. Again, in the meantime thank you for your patience!

As you may already know, our diocese, the Catholic Diocese of Memphis is in the midst of celebrating its 50th Anniversary. As part of that celebration the diocese will celebrate its first ever Eucharistic Congress this Fall.

What is a Eucharistic Congress? It is a gathering of faithful with the focus on celebrating the Eucharist which according to Vatican II is the “source and summit of the Christian life.” (CCC 1324) Many Catholics do not understand the Church’s teaching on the real presence of Christ. Sadly, less than a third believe that the bread and wine really become the Body and Blood of Christ. The Eucharistic Congress will help all in exploring the Real Presence of the Eucharist from Scripture to its role in the life of the Church and the lives of its members.

This celebration will take place on Oct. 8, 6pm-9pm, and Oct. 9, 9am-6pm, at the Renasant Center. The Renasant Center is located in downtown Memphis at 255 N Main Street. (The old Cook Convention Center) You can register for this event by going to our diocese’s website: cdom.org. Click on the Eucharistic Congress tab.

As the Land Between the Rivers, the Mississippi River and the Tennessee River, Bishop Emeritus Terry Steib stated in his homily at our 50th Anniversary Masses: “We are the Rivers of Faith and Lands of Grace.”

Please consider registering for this important event. More information will be forthcoming soon. As we get the information, we will pass it along. This is a great opportunity for all the organizations in our parish. Youth Group, Women’s Club, Knights of Columbus, RCIA, etc., all are welcome!

Hard to believe but another 50th anniversary is upon us. That would be the Golden Anniversary of our Knights of Columbus Council here at St. William. St. William Council #6321 of the Knights of Columbus was formed on November 4, 1971. I remember Terry Hunt, and Jim Zapalac, coming over to our house and talking to my dad about getting a Council started. The general consensus was from the powers that be was that it wouldn’t last. But here we are 50 years later with second and third generation Knights continuing the work started by those men they called Knights. How to Get the Most out of the Eucharist

I recently read a book by this title, written by Michael Dubruiel. He explains how over the years, the attitudes of most Catholics have changed. Forty years or more ago those who attended Mass believed much more so in the sacrificial aspects of the Mass and in their faith in general. The faithful then looked at the sufferings and pains in their lives as an opportunity to “offer it up” to God, as Jesus offered himself up for us. In recent times, however, this attitude of sacrificial offering of the Mass has become an attitude of a “Eucharistic Banquet” – the meal aspect of the Mass, where fellowship is seen as more important than worshipping God.

I highly recommend this book to all. Mr. Dubruiel uses the word letters in the word SACRIFICE to give us a mnemonic device to see the connection between our lives and what we do at Mass. Below is an extremely brief look at these nine letters and the connections we can make to gain greater meaning in our lives and the importance of the Mass and the Eucharist.

S... Serve – Foster an attitude of service toward God in the Eucharist. God is always right! Believing this can lead us to wanting to serve God with our lives every minute of every day. We should ask God every day what He wants us to do to serve him. By doing this, we then begin to develop a Eucharistic Spirituality.

A... Adore – We were given the commandment to Worship God alone. We are not to worship false gods. What are some of the false gods that can present themselves at the Eucharist? These false gods can be the sin of pride. Do we only accept what the Church teaches if it suits our needs? Do we reject other teachings because we don’t want to accept that what we may be doing or how we are living goes against the Gospels and the teachings of the Church? Do we make God in our image to suit us instead of Adoring God as God and changing ourselves to live as he teaches? When we truly adore God, then we fully trust in God.

C... Confess your belief in God – The loss of the sense of personal sin reduces our capacity to feel the necessity of our need to be saved by Jesus. We must admit our need for God in our lives and ask God for his mercy. We must pray.

R... Respond by participating. Make an offering of your voice and body to God. Participate fully in the Mass by when the hymns are sung; sit, stand and kneel during the appropriate times during Mass. Participate in the prayers offered during the Mass.

I... Incline your ear to the Lord. This is a way to offer the sacrifice of our thoughts in order to first listen to what God is saying. When we open ourselves up to the reality that God wishes to speak to use through his Holy Word, we will find our hearts will be filled with joy. Hearing the Word of God can change our lives by leading us closer to God and His will for us.

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
How to Get the Most out of the Eucharist

F...Fast in anticipation. We are called to fast 1 hour prior to receiving the Eucharist. Do we use this time of fasting anticipating who we will receive in this greatest gift? We can offer our time of fasting up for the needs of others, or to help us overcome our own faults and desires. Our fasting can be a prayer. We can also fast at other times and offer that up as a sacrifice for a particular need.

I... Invite the Lord to come. Welcome God into your life and your heart. Invite the Lord to be with you in your daily life – at work or home; in your joy and in your suffering. Be welcoming to others, as you would to God.

C... Commune; Receive the Eucharist. The Eucharist is a “Who”, not a “what”. St. Ignatius of Antioch called the Eucharist the “medicine of immortality”. Jesus who is totally present body, blood, soul and divinity in the Eucharist gives us eternal life. When we come to communion and believe in the power of Jesus to ward off all our death-induced behaviors and to help us live as members of the kingdom of heaven, we truly will get the most out of the Eucharist. He will live in use and we in communion with him.

E...Evangelize: Share the Good News. We should be living out the Gospel in our daily lives. We should trust that the Holy Spirit will give us the words to speak when we witness the power of Christ to others. We should not be afraid to speak about God and be proud witnesses to our faith. When we are dismissed from Mass, we are being sent to share the Good News of God to others, strengthened by the Eucharist.

What are the Knights up to lately?


I hope this note finds you well and enjoying your summer. Your Knights are steady at it, working towards living the Gospel as Jesus commands us to.

We had enough to feed both events plus serve an extra 20 at Constance Abbey halfway house. The Elliott and Warman families provided slaw, the Harpers provided Baked Beans, and Mrs. Grand Knight made the potato salad just the way I like it. Thank you for providing what you did and I'm pleased to report that NOTHING was wasted. John and Ann Moeller generously donated socks and underwear that Butch brought, and we handed them out to very appreciative people who needed them. Thank you, thank you, thank you! We welcome the St William Women's Club to participation in this ministry. They will serve a meal to the Homeless at St Patrick's Sunday the 1st of August. We're happy and proud of the Women's club. Your Knights will serve our next meal the 5th of September. This charitable event has been self-supporting thanks to your generosity and prayers. We gladly accept donations to fund the cost and keep this going to care for the least of our brothers and sisters.

Another way your Knights are supporting our faith is with Confidential Care Mobile Ministry, a faith based mobile ultrasound facility supporting respect and dignity for life. Several of your Knights pony up their personal time (and often their personal cash) every month to do maintenance on the RV that contains the ultrasound equipment. This is **Faith in Action** from ordinary people doing ordinary things to support an extraordinary service. Great things are made up of ordinary building blocks placed one at a time by ordinary people until the extraordinary is accomplished.

So, you're saying to yourself, "I'm not a mechanic and I don't have the bucks to donate to this, what can I do?" Pray. Pray for the respect and dignity of all life. And your Knights have a program for that: The Silver Rose Prayer Service. We don't have the schedule yet for the Silver Rose but it's coming. This is a prayer service/pilgrimage that demonstrates unity between Knights of Columbus in Canada, the United States, and Mexico through a prayer service promoting the dignity of ALL human life and honoring Our Lady of Guadalupe. Each year we have done this it gets better participation and enthusiasm; this year will be no exception. This is a way for us as a parish to prayerfully demonstrate our commitment to the respect for life and unity with each other by making an extra commitment outside of a scheduled Mass to drop to our knees together to pray for the dignity of life and honor Our Lady. The Transfiguration

Our divine Redeemer, being in Galilee about a year before His sacred Passion, took with him St. Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, Sts. James and John, and led them to a retired mountain. Whilst Jesus prayed, he suffered that glory which was always due to his sacred humility, and of which, for our sake, He deprived it, to diffuse a ray over His whole body. His face was altered and shone as the sun, and his garments became white as snow. Moses and Elias were seen by the three apostles in his company on this occasion, and were heard discoursing with him of the death which he was to suffer in Jerusalem.

The three apostles were wonderfully delighted with this glorious vision, and St. Peter cried out to Christ, "Lord, it is good for us to be here. Let us make three tents: one for thee, one for Moses, and one for Elias" Whilst St. Peter was speaking, there came, on a sudden, a bright shining cloud from heaven, an emblem of the presence of God's majesty, and from out of this cloud was heard a voice which said, "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased; hear ye him" The apostles that were present, upon hearing this voice, were seized with a sudden fear, and fell upon the ground; but Jesus, going to them, touched them, and bade them to rise. They immediately did so, and saw no one but Jesus standing in his ordinary state.

This vision happened in the night. As they went down the mountain early the next morning, Jesus bade them not to tell any one what they had seen till he should be risen from the dead.



A Time to Persevere

The days of summer have provided a welcome change of pace. However, while vacations afford us the time to relax and refresh, the change of habits and routines can also have a negative impact on our spiritual lives. As if to re-ignite us, the Church offers us in the plethora of August feasts vivid examples of the virtue of perseverance: six martyrs — two who are named in Canon I of the Mass and two who were martyred during World War II; seven founders of religious congregations, as well as three popes and two kings; the apostle, St. Bartholomew; the great Doctor of the Church, St. Augustine and St. Monica, his mother; the humble patron saint of parish priests, St. John Vianney, and the patron of deacons, St. Lawrence, who joked with his executioners while being roasted alive.



It is never too late to begin — as the life of the reformed sinner, St. Augustine teaches us — nor too difficult to begin again, as demonstrated by the conversion of the martyr, St. Teresa Benedicta (Edith Stein). We present-day members of the Mystical Body are certain of the reward to which we are called, for Christ's Transfigured body (August 6) is a preview of that glory. Moreover, in the Assumption of his Mother (August 15), Our Lord has demonstrated his fidelity to his promise. Her privilege is "the highest fruit of the Redemption" and "our consoling assurance of the coming of our final hope — the glorification which is Christ's" (*Enchiridion on Indulgences*).

The Blessed Virgin Mary is the most perfect example of Christian perseverance, but she is also our advocate in heaven where she is crowned Queen of Heaven and Earth (August 22). Mary is the "Mother of Perpetual Help", the patroness of the Congregation founded by St. Alphonsus Liguori (August 1). "No one who has fled to her protection is left unaided" is the claim of the *Memorare* of St. Bernard (August 20). Heretics have returned to the faith by the prayers of her Rosary, first preached by St. Dominic (August 8) in the twelfth Century, and hearts have been converted by the graces received while wearing her Miraculous Medal, promoted by St. Maximilian Kolbe (August 14) and adopted as the "badge" for the Pious Union he founded. *Hail, holy Queen, Mother of Mercy, our life, our sweetness and our hope!*

August is often considered the transitional month in our seasonal calendar. It is the time of the year we begin to wind-down from our summer travels and vacations and prepare for Autumn — back to school, fall festivals, harvest time, etc. The Church in her holy wisdom has provided a cycle of events in its liturgical year which allow the faithful to celebrate the major feasts in the life of Christ and Mary. Most notably, during August, we celebrate the feast of the **Transfiguration** (August 6) and the feast of the **Assumption** (August 15).



St. Eusebius of Vercelli

March 2, 283 – August 1, 371

Eusebius was the founder of the canons regular, priests living under a religious rule and dedicated to pastoral work. The canons regular was the immediate result of the rise of monasticism in the East, and St. Eusebius of Vercelli saw the possibilities of this new movement for the clergy. His example was imitated all over the West and brought about a renewal of clerical life. He was born in Sardinia and as a child was taken to Rome, where he became a member of the Roman clergy under Pope Julius. Consecrated for the see of Vercelli in 344, he gathered his clergy into a community life, founding also the dioceses of Turin and Embrun. In 355, he attended the Council of Milan as legate of Pope Liberius, which defended St. Athanasius against those Western bishops intimidated by the emperor. When Eusebius was ordered along with other bishops to condemn Athanasius, he refused, insisting instead that they all sign the Nicene Creed. When threatened by the emperor, Eusebius stood his ground and told the emperor he had no right interfering in Church matters.



In anger, the emperor sent Eusebius into exile in Palestine, where he was severely mistreated by the Arians. He was moved around from place to place and after his release by the Emperor Julian he consulted with Athanasius in Alexandria on the Arian crisis. Returning to Italy, he joined with St. Hilary of Poitiers in opposing the Arian bishop of Milan and returned to Vercelli amid the rejoicing of his people.

Eusebius is considered by many to be the author of the Athanasian Creed, and a copy of the Gospels written in his own hand is preserved in the cathedral at Vercelli. He died on August 1, 371, his courage in suffering for the faith inspiring other bishops to oppose the Arian heresy.

- ◇ St. Eusebius of Vercelli refused to "go along with the crowd," even when threatened by an emperor, and he suffered long and cruelly for his convictions. Sometimes we have to oppose others, especially in matters that are important, and how we do it is as important as that we do it. We should never lose our Christian kindness and gentle manner, even in opposing others, but it should be very clear where we stand.
