### The Four Cardinal Virtues (part 3)

This month, we will discuss the Cardinal Virtue of **Fortitude**. The Catechism of the Catholic Church tells us in paragraph 1808:

*Fortitude* is the moral virtue that ensures firmness in difficulties and constancy in the pursuit of the good. It strengthens the resolve to resist temptations and to overcome obstacles in the moral life. The virtue of fortitude enables one to conquer fear, even fear of death, and to face trials and persecutions. It disposes one even to renounce and sacrifice his life in defense of a just cause. "The Lord is my strength and my song." <sup>70</sup> "In the world you have tribulation; but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world." <sup>71</sup>.

Fortitude is a virtue that we need to embrace and live in our daily lives. This virtue, like all virtues, is acquired by doing virtuous acts repeatedly. This disposes us to act in morally good ways and help us with sharing and living out the Gospel message Jesus taught us to live and aids us in our spiritual growth.



Fortitude helps us to remain in Christ and to live a morally good life in spite of the temptations, social expectations and pressures within our daily lives that we encounter. Through the Sacraments and the graces we receive from them we are strengthened with fortitude to help us to resist these things that can put barriers between us and God. Fortitude will help us to avoid sin.

As we prepare for the coming of the child Jesus, let fortitude be your guide and strength to help us remember this Advent Season is a season of preparing for eternal life with Christ. May this virtue of Fortitude guide us to remember the needs of the poor, lonely, homeless and despairing.

#### Volunteer Not-for-Profit Organizations

**The Great Adventure Bible Timeline**, is a ground-breaking approach to understanding salvation history developed by renowned Catholic Bible teacher Jeff Cavins.

The Great Adventure Bible Timeline Philosophy:

- Identifies the 14 narrative books that tell the story of Scripture from beginning to end.

The remaining “supplemental books” of the Bible are then contextualized within the storyline of the 14 narrative books.

- Divides the Bible into 12 time periods, identified by different colors, which serve as “chapters” in Salvation History.

**How to Use the Reading Plan:**

This reading plan covers the entire Catholic Bible in 365 days. Readings in bold refer to the 14 narrative books of the Bible.

The Psalms and Proverbs are spread out throughout the year to provide additional opportunity for prayer, reflection, and practical wisdom. The Psalms in italics have a particular connection to that day’s other readings.

## Saint John of the Cross' Story

John is a saint because his life was a heroic effort to live up to his name: "of the Cross." The folly of the cross came to full realization in time. "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me" (Mark 8:34b) is the story of John's life. The Paschal Mystery—through death to life—strongly marks John as reformer, mystic-poet, and theologian-priest.


Ordained a Carmelite priest in 1567 at age 25, John met Teresa of Avila and like her, vowed himself to the primitive Rule of the Carmelites. As partner with Teresa and in his own right, John engaged in the work of reform, and came to experience the price of reform: increasing opposition, misunderstanding, persecution, imprisonment. He came to know the cross acutely—to experience the dying of Jesus—as he sat month after month in his dark, damp, narrow cell with only his God.

Yet, the paradox! In this dying of imprisonment John came to life, uttering poetry. In the darkness of the dungeon, John's spirit came into the Light. There are many mystics, many poets; John is unique as mystic-poet, expressing in his prison-cross the ecstasy of mystical union with God in the *Spiritual Canticle*.

But as agony leads to ecstasy, so John had his *Ascent to Mt. Carmel*, as he named it in his prose masterpiece. As man-Christian-Carmelite, he experienced in himself this purifying ascent; as spiritual director, he sensed it in others; as psychologist-theologian, he described and analyzed it in his prose writings. His prose works are outstanding in underscoring the cost of discipleship, the path of union with God: rigorous discipline, abandonment, purification. Uniquely and strongly John underlines the gospel paradox: The cross leads to resurrection, agony to ecstasy, darkness to light, abandonment to possession, denial to self to union with God. If you want to save your life, you must lose it. John is truly "of the Cross." He died at 49—a life short, but full.

### Reflection

In his life and writings, John of the Cross has a crucial word for us today. We tend to be rich, soft, comfortable. We shrink even from words like *self-denial*, *mortification*, *purification*, *asceticism*, *discipline*. We run from the cross. John's message—like the gospel—is loud and clear: Don't—if you really want to live!
